Bradshaw's Yard

Runs off the south side of the High Street and approached by a narrow entry between numbers 118 and 119.

Also Known as Drinkwater's Yard, Welch's or Welsh's Yard, in each case named after a nearby tradesman.

On the eastern and western corners of the High Street approach were:

No. 118: John Drinkwater in 1811 census and prior to that a Mary Drinkwater, grocer, was recorded in a trade directory of 1793 in Brentford, address not known; a tea dealers / grocers, then boot & shoe makers in C19 and a coffee room by 1901. Later occupants included a solicitors, then HF Davis builders by 1933. [tithe ref 42 on map below]


No. 119: William Welch in 1811 census; a bakery by 1839 (Welch). By 1851 William Welch had retired and Thomas Bradshaw, also a baker, was living in the Welch household. Thomas Bradshaw remained here running his bakery until the 1890s and this address appears with his name in a 1913 trade directory as a corn merchants.

No occupants recorded in the 1920s/30s; in 1940 C Ronald Sinclair, marine engineer, ran a boat yard at this address.

Records:

Bradshaw's Yard was formerly known as Drinkwater Yard in **1790** (Nigel Moore). The 1811 census for New Brentford records 'Mr Drinkwaters Yard' with one occupant: Joseph Ellis.



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The **1838** tithe map for New Brentford (above) shows Bradshaw's Yard marked as 152b, leading south off the High Street between property refs 41 & 42, opposite the Market Place, down to the Basin, later Brentford Dock. Only one property (ref 161) is shown as occupied, lying on the western side. Also on the western side is a large building (ref 160) near the Basin: this was a malthouse and was noted in a conveyance from Elizabeth Tillyer to Francis Ashton in 1910. Not located in the **1841** census: searched for 'Chalk' in New Brentford (see next paragraph), without success. The census covers the High Street occupants numbers 118 and 119, at the end of Bradshaw's Yard, consecutively: the yard may be covered in another part of the census

In the **1844 Poor Rate** (below: original is in Chiswick Library) the yard was called Welch's yard, after the baker. The Welch's Yard properties owned by William Welch consisted of a house (occupied by 'Chalk') and a factory (which had a gross estimated rental of £55). He also owned the house, shop, garden, wharf, yard and shed recorded as part of the High Street property, which later was numbered 119.

1909/10 Valuation

In 1844 the yard, wharf and nearby buildings were all held by the owner of 119 High Street. At the time of the 1909/10 Valuation the owner of 119 owned two coach houses and stables, presumably behind the High Street property and off Bradshaw's Yard; there is no reference to his owning the wharf too.

1911 Kelly's Directory for Ealing, Acton, Hanwell, Brentford, Gunnersbury and Chiswick

Bradshaw's Yard is included in the street directory, but no residents are recorded.

1911 Census

Bradshaw's Yard has not been found in the census. The occupants in 1901, William Henry and Caroline Swainston, were at 7 Catherine Wheel Yard, another good location for William Henry's work as a lighterman.
